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There are 41 in the Dance of Death series. They're printed at approximately 9cm x 13cm, which is several times larger than the original woodcuts. They show Death, in the form of a skeleton, claiming people from various walks of life: the Pope, a Duke, a ploughman....The primary message is clear; as it says in Ecclesiastes (2:16), "And how dieth the wise man? as the fool."

death: no matter one's station in life, the Dance of Death unites all. The Danse Macabre consists of the dead or personified Death summoning representatives from all walks of life to dance along to the grave, typically with a pope, emperor, king, child, and labourer. They were produced as mementos mori, to remind people of the fragility of their lives and how vain were the glories of earthly life. Its origins are postulated from illustrated sermon texts; the earliest recorded visual scheme was a now-lost mural in the Saints Innocents Cemetery in Paris dating from 1424 to 1425.
